SPRINGTIME TIPS

Spring weather may be tricky for tortoise custodians, but our desert tortoises know what they are doing! While we all enjoy the springtime weather, here are some tips that can help you and your tortoise adjust to some weekly climate changes as we move into March and out of brumation.



- Your tortoise will start to stir when temperatures reach 70 80 degrees. She may come out one day, but not the next...that's normal. She may come out and just bask in the sun...that's normal. She may even come out of the burrow and find a new place to hide for the first month...that's normal too! Keep a calendar from year to year to see what's "normal" for your tortoise.
 - Northern Nevada tortoises may still need to be housed at night if the temperatures drop below 40 degrees or get too windy.
- Hydration and drinking is the priority for your tortoise after brumation is complete and he has warmed up. Offer your tortoise a lukewarm bath after you're sure he's awake. The water should be high enough to cover the bottom part of the shell but low enough that he can stand up and raise his head above the water level to let you know when he is done drinking. Some tortoises only stay submerged for a few minutes, while other tortoises enjoy a luxurious 20-30 minute soak!
 - Your tortoise may have a chunky white discharge in his urine after his soak. That's urate salts and it is very healthy for these to be expelled in the urine. It actually prevents the tortoise from forming urinary stones or uroliths!
- Feeding is secondary to hydration. Let your tortoise browse around the yard and graze before offering tortoise food. A tortoise in the spring will be cold and needs to warm up in the sun so they can metabolize their food properly. Don't be alarmed if they are not ready to eat right away.
 - * Remember to only offer your tortoise safe plants and no fruits. They cannot metabolize the sugars. Refer to TG Care Sheets on our website for lists of plants and flowers that desert tortoises love!

Take a good look at your tortoise. If you think she is sick or notice any bubbles coming out of her nose, don't panic! It's just time for a trip to the vet. With proper treatment, food and access to water, you'll be able to help your pet recover and live a long and healthy life.

WHERE IS SHE NOW? JANINA LITTLE, BIOLOGICAL MONITOR

Land development projects, such as solar, pipeline, and highway projects continuously occur in the Mojave Desert outside city limits. In September 2015, Janina Little embarked on a position as a Biological Monitor whose focus is on wild desert tortoise conservation. As desert tortoises are a state and federally protected species, precautions are made to limit casualties from construction. Biologists are engaged for construction projects to ensure that contractors comply with mitigation measures prescribed by government agencies such as the United States Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS).

As a Biological Monitor, Janina's priority is to ensure no tortoises or wildlife are harmed during construction activities. A biological team will assemble and search for tortoises ahead of construction, and then move them out of the way before construction begins. Most projects are required to install tortoise exclusion fencing in order to keep tortoises away from construction. Biological Monitors make sure this fencing is erected properly, will check it routinely to repair any portions degraded from rain, erosion or off road vehicle vandalism. Biologists also check under heavy equipment as tortoises will use the shade of equipment as temporary shelters. If a tortoise is located, Biologists record its health and may mark the tortoise for future identification. Radio transmitters can be placed on the tortoise in order to track its movement in the future. After proper handling, the tortoise is placed within a USFWS prescribed distance away from the project area in the best suitable habitat, inside of a burrow and near ideal tortoise foragable plants

Janina doesn't just look for tortoises. Bighorn sheep, protected and nesting birds, coyotes, ravens, kit foxes, and cacti are recorded, tracked and if possible, removed from the construction zone. Other environmental concerns such as the accidental chemical spill and litter are addressed, tracked and mitigated. Biological Monitors continuously educate every construction worker about the biology, laws and the onsite precautions to help the desert tortoise. Most workers are excited to learn that there is a concerted effort to help protect not only the desert tortoise but the surrounding environment for our future generations. Many construction workers have adopted a desert tortoise and tell terrific tortoise stories of their own!

SPRINGTIME TIPS FOR NORTHERN NEVADA

The weather in Northern Nevada has been confusing both to tortoises and their custodians! Most tortoises stayed up way past their bedtime – all the way until the end of October!! Now the weather has been in the 60s and 70s already which is unusually warm. Northern Nevada tortoises do best when the temperature is between 40 and 50 degrees. Many custodians keep a thermometer in their winter container so they can check on them, keeping them in the coolest place possible during the day and even covering their container with a blanket if the night time temperature drops below 40 degrees.

When your Northern Nevada tortoise starts to scratch or tries to crawl out, it's time to give them a warm soak in tepid water and ¼ cup electrolyte solution for 10 -15 minutes. Make sure they are completely dry in case they want to go back to sleep. Once they are completely out of brumation and the temperature is above 60 degrees, they can be moved to their outside burrow. This is the time when they will start grazing and you can consider feeding them tortoise chow. You can look for the closest TG Seller on page 2 of this newsletter or at TortoiseGroup.org and ask any of these friendly tortoise custodians about caring for your tortoise in Northern Nevada.

TIPS FOR EVERY BACKYARD HABITAT

- Check for places where your tortoise might get stuck, including areas where he can climb and flip over.
- Make sure your fences and gate barriers are sturdy, strong and have no gaps. A lost tortoise is a very hard to find!
